RATIONALE

- The setting of homework provides students with the opportunity to consolidate the learning that takes place at school, transferring essential knowledge to long-term memory.
- Homework involves parents in their child's learning and strengthens the home/school partnership.
- Homework tasks help to develop our personal learning and thinking skills such as independent enquiry, self-management and creative thinking.
- Homework helps pupils to develop perseverance and self-discipline and this helps the development of confidence to deal with frustrations and overcome problems.

Homework will:

- be stimulating and challenging
- consolidate and extend work covered during lessons
- prepare for new learning
- develop research skills
- provide opportunities for independent study, including choices of presentation
- enhance study skills of planning, time management and self-discipline
- encourage students to take ownership and responsibility for their own learning
- engage parental cooperation and support
- prepare students for tests and exams
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Students will:

- recognise the value of homework in improving learning
- complete tasks to the best of their ability, taking pride in content and presentation

- endeavour to meet all deadlines
- organise their own independent study time
- use Satchel One and their planner to keep to deadlines
- seek appropriate support when necessary
- record all tasks and deadlines in their planners
- involve parents/carers when appropriate

Parents are asked to:

- check planners and Satchel One for details of homework
- support their children in organising their time to meet deadlines
- try to provide suitable working conditions
- take an active interest in their child's homework in terms of its content and quality
- be aware of any task(s) causing undue stress and contact the college (through the form tutor in the first instance)

Teachers will:

- set homework according to this policy and record on Satchel One
- ensure tasks are clearly stated and understood by all students
- set appropriate tasks, which students are able to complete without the support of the teacher
- set clear, realistic deadlines (not set for the next day)
- set high expectations of content and presentation when appropriate
- hold students to account for the completion of homework on time and to the expected standard

Homework tasks may include the following:

- Practice of skills learned during lessons
- Application of knowledge covered during the lesson (based on worked examples, model paragraphs etc.)
- Retrieval practice
- Background reading
- Preparation for assessments

Sanctions

- If a deadline is missed, the student will receive a warning and a new deadline will be set. The teacher will speak to the student in order to understand why the deadline was missed and offer appropriate support.
- If a second deadline is missed, the student will receive a homework detention of 1 hour.
- Students will receive a homework detention for any subsequent missed deadline during the same half-term period.
- If a student is concerned about missing a deadline, it is expected that they speak to the teacher in advance, and negotiate an extension (if this is deemed appropriate by the

teacher).

- An after-school homework club is available for all students to attend, during which students have access to support from a member of staff and IT facilities.
