The topics covered are below.

- **Section A - Social influence** – How do others affect you?
- **Section B - Memory** – How does your memory work?
- **Section C- Research methods** - How do you carry out psychological research?

- **Please note there will be one extended question (9 marker(s)) to answer in the assessment.**
